### DEL086 NATIONAL GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Councillor Joseph Haweil

Councillor Joseph Haweil advised that between 18 – 20 June he had the honour of representing Council at the National General Assembly of Local Government, hosted by the Australian Local Government Association in Canberra.

Cr Haweil reported as follows:

This year's Assembly was the largest in years with around 850 delegates in attendance under the theme "Australia's Future – Make It Local".

In his opening remarks to the Assembly, ALGA President, Mayor David O'Loughlin discussed the erosion of confidence in public institutions including government, elected officials and the media. According to Cr O'Loughlin, because communities are seeking to control their own future, and make local decisions, Councils must be transparent about strategy, expenditure and revenue. He also noted that there is a greater need for diversity across the local government sector. Referring to the topical recycling challenges facing Australian councils, the ALGA President spoke to the need to turn around kerb-side plastics into ongoing use and create ongoing demand for these materials.

The Assembly was next addressed by The Hon. Dr John McVeigh, Minister for Regional Development, Territories and Local Government who spoke with particular reference to Commonwealth programs to assist with local roads, referring to the Roads to Recovery program which has seen \$4.8 billion allocated from 2013/14 to 2022; the blackspot program and the \$60 million per year bridges renewal program which has been 166 bridges rebuilt across Australia. The Minister also highlighted the Melbourne to Brisbane in-land rail project which is intended to open up freight opportunities connecting farms, mines, cities and ports to global markets.

A highlight of the first day's proceedings was a talk by SkyNews Political Editor David Speers who commenced his remarks by referring to Australian political parties presently grappling with who they represent and what they stand for. In particular, he discussed the great angst that the minor parties have caused the major parties in recent elections. These small groups themselves struggle to work out what they stand for beyond the protest vote and impact the stability of parliamentary democracy. Speers noted in particular the impact of the so-called Senate citizenship saga which has diminished democracy and weakened the national debate.

Also on the first day of the Assembly, a panel discussion entitled 'Balancing Innovation and the Public Spirit' was conducted with a number of expert participants. Professor Veena Sahajwalla of the University of New South Wales gave a very interesting presentation on Australian ingenuity and research unlocking the value embedded in high quality waste materials and how these may be marketed commercially. Professor Sahajwalla noted that 42 million tonnes of electronic waste was generated in 2014, increasing 3-4% each year. In a groundbreaking program, the University of New South Wales is using micro-factories to manufacture smart materials for high-end applications through recycled materials. For example, a micro-factory centre focusing on this field at the UNSW has made synthetic stone using mixed glass, produced filaments from waste plastics and then using 3D printers to manufacture items out of this. Expensive alloys and other materials found in e-waste can be used to create new alloys. The transformation of high-value waste into costeffective green materials is an interesting field of research and create lucrative new markets for waste. A subsequent presentation from Professor Ron Bartsch of the Asia Pacific Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems Consortium covered the increasing use of drones at the local government sector. We were told that drones can be used effectively by local councils for subdivisions, illegal dumping, roads, parks and sporting field works. Interestingly, in congested cities like Jakarta, drones are being used to fly critical medical supplies. etc. The public interest is vital in the rapid development of these new technologies.

Finally, I wish to provide an update on two addresses from The Hon. Stephen Jones MP, Shadow Minister for Regional Services, Territories and Local Government and The Hon. Bill Shorten MP, Opposition Leader.

Stephen Jones advised that Labor supports constitutional recognition of local government which would allow the Commonwealth to directly fund local government. Closer to home, Mr Jones argued that there was a lack of new funding for infrastructure in the most recent Federal budget. He noted that if elected, Labor will place more conditions on infrastructure grants to the State Governments to ensure greater public goods outcomes, including traineeships and use of local businesses. Labor will also require the design of new roads to incorporate smart technologies.

The Opposition Leader spoke to his commitment to supporting the local government sector, arguing that we "represent the most accessible, the most practical, the most accountable level of government in this country" and can be very influential in the formulation of national policy. Mr Shorten noted that Labor has received submissions for 800 shovel ready projects which have been submitted directly from local government in the last year and would use this data as a basis for future support at the local level. According to Mr Shorten, the fanfare around "City Deals" has not been matched by follow through with local governments complaining of only having been brought in at the end of the process and regions not understanding what each council would get under the deals. The last two points I'll make are firstly that the Opposition Leader spent a large part of his address discussing the need to prioritise revitalisation of urban waterways and that they should not be treated as tips and sewers as has been the case in the past and secondly that he is open to waste-to-energy proposals given that 60% of household waste is already recycled.

As always, the Assembly was a useful opportunity to network with Councillors, representatives of the Commonwealth Government and local government sector service provides. As I have highlighted in this report, I had the opportunity to engage actively in all of the Assembly's sessions and hope to draw on the knowledge attained in contributing to forthcoming the work of our Council.

#### DEL087 BROADMEADOWS REVITALISATION BOARD

Councillor Naim Kurt

Councillor Naim Kurt advised that he recently attended meeting number 6 of the Broadmeadows Revitalisation Board Meeting, held on 22nd June 2018.

Cr Kurt advised that as part of the agenda, a number of initiatives which are underway were discussed including:

- the State Governments \$14.3 million commitment to Broadmeadows in the 2016/17 Victorian State Budget;
- the Town Hall Redevelopment, \$7 million contributed and work is underway and due for completion in July/August 2019;
- Meadowlink Planning and Improvement Works has been signed off and finalised by the Minister for Planning and Construction is now able to commence in June;
- \$3 million Railway Station Improvements;
- works to the bus interchange area are largely completed;
- the station entrance is due for completion by the end of July;
- works to the pedestrian subway will be completed by the end of September 2018;
- Pascoe Vale Rd Improvements will be completed in July; and
- the \$1 million Railway Crescent Land Acquisition is being looked at by the project control group for redirection into cladding for the underpass to provide greater amenity and improve peoples' sense of safety.

Cr Kurt advised that Transport Victoria briefed the Board on the progress of the development of the business case for Broadmeadows station. They stated they are aiming to complete the business case in time for the next State budget process. It was stressed by Cr Kurt on behalf of council that the community and council is involved in these discussions and that Transport Victoria should reference Council's design work and previous plans as much as possible.

Cr Kurt advised that the board was briefed by the Banksia Gardens Community Service, on Project REAL which is a proposal to establish a Northern Centre for excellence in trauma information education. It was recommended for inclusion to the Advice to Government paper that is being prepared.

Cr Kurt also advised that he informed the board on councils application to the federal Governments Smart Suburb Program seeking \$500,000 funding for enabling technology for the Town Hall redevelopment, which received the board's full support.

Cr Kurt advised that the rest of the agenda concerned the advice to Government paper that is being prepared for the Minister for Employment and Minster for Suburban Development. The report includes advice on

investment in the Broadmeadows Town centre, renewal of urban housing, particularly DHHS housing and at Banksia Gardens, creating new jobs, linking people with jobs, building on individuals skills and aspiration for a continuance of a coordinated governance structure to continue to manage the issues and opportunities which exist in Broadmeadows post the BRAB's conclusion.

Cr Kurt advised that as part of that discussion, on behalf of Council, the point was argued that the advice should highlight the importance of a second crossing of Merlynston creek, a new train station, the provision of open space in the area and that a contribution scheme be created to fund the construction of these projects should be highlighted in the report.

Cr Kurt concluded that draft report will be agreed upon and confirmed via email and the report would be delivered to be ministers on August the 3rd, pending their availability.

### DEL088 WASTE MANAGEMENT AND RECYCLING CONFERENCE

Councillor Jack Medcraft

Councillor Jack Medcraft advised that he recently attended a Waste Management and Recycling conference held in Sydney. The conference covered areas from food waste, electronic waste and waste to energy furnaces, of which Cr Medcraft was most interested in, and how it was looked at being used as a viable source for reducing landfill and levies, and generating electricity.

Cr Medcraft advised that a council located in Kwinana in Western Australia have recently signed a deed of tender with Phoenix, a company that will build a waste management facility, with the council's part being that they will supply the waste for the facility, with no outlay required.

Cr Medcraft advised that the conference was an intensive 3 days, and there was a lot of information covered. One case study that Cr Medcraft recalled was from a company called Dresden, in which their concept is to create glasses using recycled plastic bottle tops, and are available in customisable colours for glasses frames. The glasses are guaranteed for life, and are \$25, available in both Australia and Canada,

Cr Medcraft concluded that Hume City Council was acknowledged and congratulated at the conference for initiative in creating roads incorporating recycled plastics and materials.
